

2017 SCHOOL CLIMATE SURVEY RESULTS

Schools need to be safe and welcoming places so that all students feel comfortable to learn and can be successful. In support of the Board's Safe Schools and Equity and Inclusive Education policies, as well as the provincial mandate to conduct school climate surveys, each school in the Board conducted a school climate survey for students last spring. The surveys were completed anonymously online with the intention of providing students with an opportunity to share their perspective on creating an optimal safe and caring learning environment.

During the previous year, school staff and parents/guardians provided their opinions on what they believed would contribute to a caring, safe and inclusive school. Last Spring, students in Grades 4, 6 and 7 who completed the School Climate Survey

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identified the following as areas for celebration and improvement at St. Bernadette's CES

What We Are Doing Well

- Students feel that their school shows them how to live the Catholic values which helps develop their Catholic faith and identity.
- Students indicate that their school community makes them feel respected, welcomed and included which helps them treat others with dignity and respect.
- Students say that they are learning about themselves, what they are good at, what they need help with and how they learn best, so that they can achieve their full potential and be successful.
- Students note that if they work hard in school, they feel that they have the opportunities to succeed.
- Students say that their school principal and teachers expect them to do good work.

What We Need to Improve

- Continue to help students become more resilient and focussed on achieving their potential.
- Reduce occurrences of verbal bullying by continuing bullying awareness campaigns and emphasizing the importance of seeking help.

- Increase the capacity of staff to respond to students who experience anxiety, anger or frustration.
- Increase the capacity of staff to help students who feel stressed while at school.

Feedback collected from the school climate surveys for students, along with other information gathered about our school, will be used at St. Bernadette's to promote peace, justice and the sacredness of life in support of student learning, achievement and well-being.

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
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

Code of Conduct - A Shared Responsibility

Policy statement

The Code of Conduct for the York Catholic District School Board governs the behaviour of all members of our learning community, thereby enabling schools and other Board locations to fur tion as safe, comfortable, accepting learning and teaching environments.

The York Catholic District School Board believes that all members of our learning community his the right to a safe learning and teaching environment and that each person is responsible for creating and sustaining that environment. Respect for self and others, contributing to the common good, accepting accountability and responsibility for one's own actions, seeking and granting forgiveness, acting morally and legally as a person formed in the Catholic traditions, and the promotion of self-discipline are cornerstones of this belief.

Standards of Behaviour

Respect, civility and responsible citizenship means that all members of the school community must:

- Respect and comply with all applicable federal, provincial and municipal laws.
- Demonstrate honesty and integrity.
- Respect differences in people, their ideas and opinions.
- Treat one another with dignity and respect at all times and especially when there is disagreement.
- Respect and treat others fairly, regardless of race, ancestry, place of origin, colour, ethnic origin, citizenship, religion, gender, sexual orientation, age or disability.
- Acknowledge and respect the rights of others.
- Show proper care and regard for school property and the property of others.
- Take appropriate measures to help those in need.
- Seek assistance from a member of the school staff, if necessary, to resolve conflict peacefully.
- Respect all members of the school community, especially persons in authority.
- Appreciate the need of others to work in an environment that is conducive to learning and teaching.
- Use appropriate language with all

community members, including students, teachers and persons in authority.

Who Shares the Responsibility?

A positive school climate exists when all members of staff, students and parents work together. Each partner has an important contribution to make.

The school's responsibility:

- Provide a climate that is committed to academic excellence in a safe teaching and learning environment. Foster open, honest communications with all members of the school community.
- Teach acceptance of and respect for others.
- Help students work to their full potential and develop their sense of selfworth.

The student's responsibility:

- Practice our Catholic Virtues honesty and integrity.
- · Show respect for self and others.
- Come to school prepared, on time and ready to learn.
- · Exercise self-control and self-discipline.
- Treat others with respect, kindness and dignity.
- Follow the established rules.
- · Show respect for school property.

The parent's/guardian's responsibility:

Parent(s)/guardian(s) play an important role in the education of their children and can support the efforts of school staff in maintaining a safe and respectful learning environment for all students. Parent(s)/ guardian(s) fulfill their role when they:

- Show an active interest in their child's school work and progress.
- Communicate regularly with the school
- Help their child to be neat, appropriately dressed and prepared for school
- Ensure that their child attends schoo regularly and on time.
- Promptly report to the school their child's absence or late arrival.
- Show that they are familiar with the school's Code of Conduct and rules.
- Encourage and assist their child in following the rules of behaviour.
- Assist school staff in dealing with dis ciplinary issues involving their child.



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Integrity Respect

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York Catholic District School Board Collaborative Learning Inspired by Jesus

The York Catholic District School Board supports the use of positive practices, as well as consequences for Inappropriate behaviour, including progressive discipline, which includes suspension and expulsion, where necessary, to meet the goal of creating a safe, caring and accepting school environment.

Progressive discipline is a whole school approach that uses a continuum of interventions, supports and consequences that include learning opportunities for students in order to reinforce positive behaviours and helping students make good choices.

A progressive discipline approach includes:

- Early and ongoing intervention strategies.
- Addressing inappropriate behaviour.
- Opportunities for the student to learn from the choices made.
- Parental awareness and involvement.

The following actions are taken into consideration before any consequences are applied:

- Individual student and circumstances.
- Nature and severity of the behaviour.
- Mitigating factors.
- Impact on school climate.

The Board also supports the use of suspension and expulsion where a student has committed an infraction on school property, during a school-related activity or event and in circumstances that have an impact on the school climate.

Activities leading to a possible suspension:

- Uttering a threat to inflict serious bodily harm on another person.
- Possessing alcohol or illegal drugs.
- Swearing at a teacher or at another person in a position of authority.
- Committing an act of vandalism that causes extensive damage to school property located at the pupil's school or property located on the premises of the pupil's school.
- Bullying social, relational, physical, verbal or cyber.

- Being under the influence of alcohol/drugs.
- Any act considered to be injurious to the moral tone of the school.

Suspendable activities that may lead to a possible expulsion:

- Possessing a weapon, including possessing a firearm.
- Using a weapon to cause or to threaten bodily harm to another person.
- Committing physical assault on another person that causes bodily harm requiring treatment by a medical practitioner.
- Committing sexual assault.
- Trafficking in weapons or in illegal drugs.
- · Committing robbery.
- Giving alcohol to a minor.
- Any act considered to be significantly injurious to the moral tone of the school.



Each Case is Unique

Individualization of discipline means that "one size does not fit all" and that the principals, faculty and staff shall carefully consider the histories of the students involved before determining consequences and providing support(s).

Particular attention shall be paid to the personal factors and circumstances around the incident. Communication with parents should ensure full knowledge of the pupil's situation and an understanding of the most appropriate disciplinary approach. A range of options shall be considered to address the behaviour and help students learn from their choices.

Mitigating Factors

The following factors must be taken into account if they would mitigate the seriousness of the activity for which the pupil may be or is suspended or expelled:

- 1. The pupil's ability to control his/her behaviour.
- The pupil's ability to understand the foresee able consequences of his/her behaviour.
- Whether the pupil's ongoing presence create an unacceptable risk to the safety of any person.
- 4. The pupil's history.
- Whether a progressive discipline approach has been used with the pupil.
- 6. Whether the activity for which the pupil may be or is being suspended or expelled was related to any harassment of the pupil be cause of his or her race, ethnic origin, rellgion, disability, gender or sexual orientation or to any other harassment.
- How the suspension or expulsion would affect the pupil's ongoing education.
- The age of the pupil.
- In the case of the pupil for whom an individual education plan (IEP) has been developed:
 - a. Whether the behaviour was a manifestation of a disability identified in the pupil's individual education plan.
 - b. Whether appropriate individualized accommodation has been provided.
 - Whether the suspension or expulsion is likely to result in an aggravation or worsening of the pupil's behaviour or conduct.

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
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Renewed Math Strategy

Supporting your kindergarten learner at home

- · Have a positive attitude about math.
- Use math words and concepts at home as you measure ingredients for cooking and baking ("cups," "double"), cut lengths of wrapping paper ("rectangle") or ribbon ("three times the length of the box") to wrap gifts, or make a family schedule ("days," "weeks," "hours").
- Go for a walk and look for different shapes around the neighbourhood—a soccer ball is a sphere; a stop sign is an octagon; paving stones are rectangles or irregular shape, etc.
- Roll, throw, catch, and kick balls of different sizes and talk about which one is bigger and which is smaller, which ones are heavier and lighter, and which one travels the longest or shortest distance.
- Visit the park or playground to look for different shapes—what shape is a baseball diamond? What shape is the running track? —and patterns (numbers on a hopscotch grid, numbers on license plates and the number of squares on a four-square grid).
- Ask your children questions about play —for example, what, where, why, when, who, and how? This will help them learn to self-reflect, and it will encourage problem-solving skills.
- Encourage play with measuring cups and rulers to stimulate interest in mathematical and scientific concepts.
- · Talk about the things you have seen together.
- Take your child to the grocery store and point out the scales in the produce section.

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
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<u>Christmas Production</u> <u>and Silent Auction</u>
